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Dear colleague,

Maternal mortality has been an issue of growing concern in the United States, with a maternal mortality ratio of 23.8 deaths per 100,000 live births in 2020 and nearly 700 deaths annually. In New York State in 2018, nearly half of all deaths during pregnancy and in the one-year postpartum were associated with mental health conditions, often complicated by substance use disorders. Suicide and overdose deaths are nearly always preventable.

Research shows that as many as one in seven new mothers experience symptoms of depression. Maternal depression can have a negative impact on the mother's ability to care for her child, can reduce maternal-child bonding, and can affect the child's emotional and cognitive development.

I know that many providers are very aware of these challenges and are asking the hard questions, implementing screening like the Edinboro Postnatal Depression Screening tool and initiating pharmacotherapy or referring for cognitive behavioral therapy, but some of us are not as confident providing care to these pregnant and postpartum patients.

The New York State Office of Mental Health funds a program called Project TEACH, which provides consultations by Reproductive Psychiatrists for obstetric, pediatric, primary care and psychiatric clinicians. Consultations are available each weekday and can address important topics like appropriate medications during pregnancy and breastfeeding, as well as linkage to local support and therapy.
